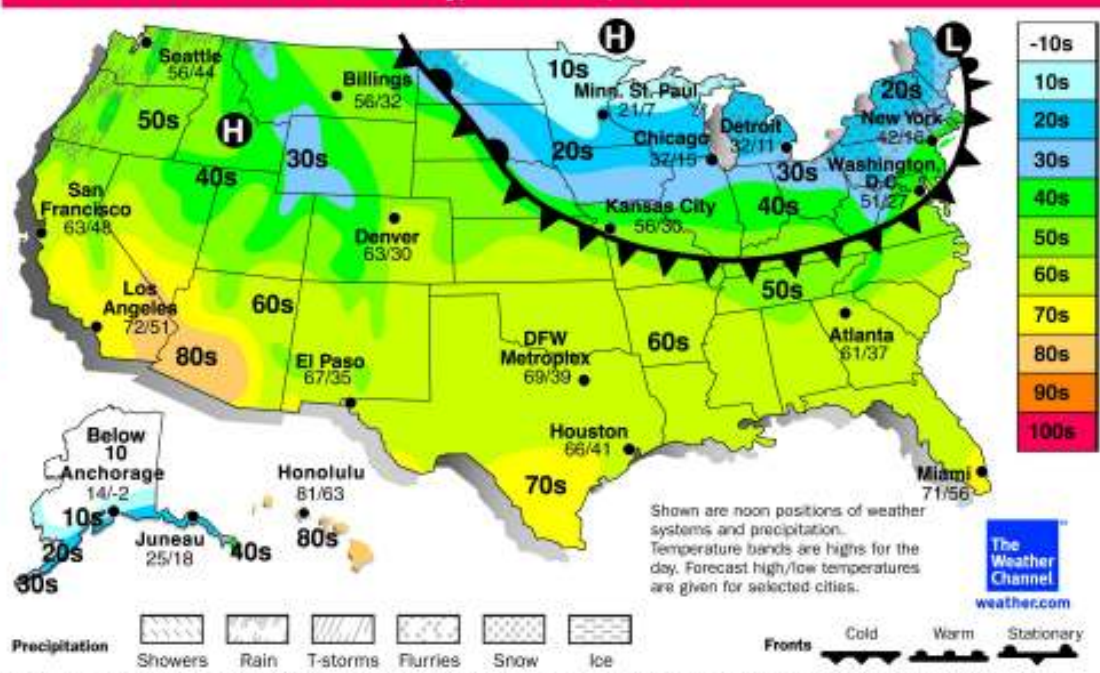

was "responsible for the work done at this place. And she did a great job" Bill Warren added.

On the first floor, the focus was in the reception area. Now a copper and slate stone cascade with running water and the company logo, specially designed by Stangl, hangs on the wall.

"That piece brings a sense of calm," Stangl said.

Stangl acknowledges the project was a challenge "because I had to bring Randall's contemporary taste into an old barn."

Stangl said the old building was brought into the 21st century through an earth-tone color pallet and high-tech lighting fixtures, to dramatize the texture and color of the stones. All natural materials, like granite, were used to achieve a timeless look. Radiant heat and a new roof completed the renovation.

The first floor also holds the conference room, while on the second floor there are three offices that expect to hold up to eight full-time personnel in the future, according to Randall Warren.

Inside the new office space, the original rough-hewn beams are a focus of attention, and a true piece of history.

"There is not a single nail in the original foundation, only wood pegs, just like in old

times. We actually had Amish constructors helping, because they are the only ones that know how to do this like they did back then," Randall Warren said.

The Lionville National Historic District, aiming to maintain the barn's history, also assisted in the project, the owners said.

The wood planks on the first floor were built with actual barn siding that was milled to replicate traditional barn flooring from the 18th century. Each floorboard belonged to a local existing barn.

The artwork that completes the look is all from Chester County artists.

"To finalize the project we are still waiting for more art work and lots of plants," Stangl said.

The carriage barn was owned by the Ruark family for most of the 20th century. Barbara Ruark, one of the previous owners, still lives across the street.

According to Elric Endersby and Alex Greenwood, founders of the New Jersey Barn Co., a 30-year-old outfit dedicated to dismantling, repairing and relocating historic barns, they think that old barns in the Northeast are noble artifacts of the industry and ingenuity of America's early settlers.

They estimate that only 2 to 3 percent of the area's original barns survive to this day, and only one in every 10 to 20 endangered barns they encounter is worth saving.

The Warrens say they are extremely happy with the result, and that shows in the pride they take in the place.

"We made an effort to make people feel comfortable," Bill Warren said.

get out and talk to everyone in the organization. Nothing can replace open and honest face-to-face communication."

Of course, using e-mail rather than personal discussion can also delay decision-making. "I find that many executives avoid conversation because they may be forced to make a decision or express an opinion," said one respondent. "If they can keep communications within e-mail, they can continually pass the buck around or back without having to commit. Management by failure to act may be the new favored process."

In other cases, communicating via technology can be effective. "Instant messages and e-mail are communication accelerators," said one executive. "Discussion databases are more efficient for larger groups. But there is no substitute for in-person communication when appropriate."

"Our organization uses DVDs as a medium to distrib-

ute corporate messages to significant segments of the work force and it is effective," said another.

The key is to use the correct communication method at the right time. "When give-and-take is required, there is no form of communication that works better than getting out of one's chair and speaking to the person face to face," said one survey respondent. "If personal discussion is not an option, the telephone or Web conferencing is an acceptable second choice. If you aren't concerned about the response, then e-mail, text message and memos work fine for pronouncements from on high."
